Re: End Immigration Detention Contracts Expiring in 2023

Dear President Biden, Secretary Mayorkas, and Acting Director Johnson:

We, the undersigned groups, call on you to end all Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) detention contracts expiring in 2023. These include, but are not limited to:

- Alamance County Jail (North Carolina), was set to expire on 1/31/2023
- Webb County Detention Center (Texas), was set to expire on 2/28/2023
- Sherburne County Jail (Minnesota), set to expire on 5/2/2023
- Caroline Detention Facility (Virginia), set to expire on 6/30/2023
- Laredo Processing Center (Texas), set to expire on 6/30/2023
- Monroe County Detention Dorm (Michigan), set to expire on 6/30/2023
- Okmulgee County Jail (Oklahoma), set to expire on 7/16/2023
- El Valle Detention Facility (Texas), set to expire on 7/17/2023
- Elizabeth Contract Detention Facility (New Jersey), set to expire on 8/31/2023
- **Joe Corley Processing Center** (Texas), set to expire on 8/31/2023
- ICA Farmville Detention Center (Virginia), set to expire on 9/15/2023
- Plymouth County Correctional Facility (Massachusetts), set to expire on 9/21/2023

On the campaign trail, President Biden promised to prioritize the dignity of immigrants and those seeking safety in the United States. As he took office in January 2021, the <u>number of people in ICE detention had decreased to approximately 15,000</u> (due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the previous administration's anti-asylum policies). These historically low numbers provided the Biden administration with an opportunity to chart a new path. Instead, the number of people detained began increasing again after the first month of President Biden's term. In addition, on the campaign trail President Biden <u>committed to ending the use of private immigration detention centers</u>, but his January 2021 Executive Order phasing out federal private prisons excluded facilities used by DHS to detain immigrants and at least <u>one of the facilities</u> closed under the executive order has been converted to an ICE facility.

While we welcome the steps the administration has taken by ending the use of Bristol County Correctional Facility, Irwin County Detention Center, Etowah County Detention Center, Berks County Residential Center, and Yuba County Jail, ICE detention has continued to expand, detention numbers have nearly doubled, and conditions remain dire. As of February 21, 2023, there were 27,257 people in detention.

For decades, government oversight agencies, media outlets, and local advocates have <u>documented inhumane conditions, mistreatment, abuse, inadequate medical care</u>, and death at immigration detention facilities nationwide. The ICE facilities with contracts expiring this year are no exception.

For example, El Valle Detention Center in Raymondville, Texas is an infamous ICE detention facility of many names and histories of abuse. It was previously the Willacy County Processing Center and, when it opened in 2006, the largest ICE detention center in the country. Immigration advocates dubbed it "Tent City" or "Ritmo" due to the abusive conditions. In 2011, the facility was converted into a Bureau of Prisons facility and renamed the Willacy County Correctional Center. ICE was forced to close the facility in 2015 after continued reports of abuse and protests by people incarcerated there highlighted poor medical care, sexual abuse, and unsafe living conditions. In 2019, ICE reopened the facility under its current name, El Valle, but the problems continued. In July 2020, 40 women detained at El Valle went on a hunger strike, protesting the lack of cleaning supplies and personal protective equipment that could prevent exposure to COVID-19. El Valle's current contract is set to expire on July 17, 2023.

In New Jersey, advocates have long supported the call for closure of the Elizabeth Contract Detention Facility. In August 2021, ICE quietly extended the Elizabeth contract to circumvent a New Jersey state law that would close the facility. Multiple reports have documented unsafe living conditions and retaliation at the facility, including a 2018 report from a team of researchers and legal and health professionals from Human Rights First that highlighted the substandard medical care, poor food quality, and insufficient ventilation that led to many immigrants' health problems. The Elizabeth contract is set to expire on August 31, 2023.

In addition, the ICA-Farmville Detention Center in Virginia, operated by the private prison corporation Immigration Centers of America, has a <u>years-long history of documented abuse and inhumane conditions</u>, including the use of force by guards, retaliation for complaints, worms in the food provided to immigrants, and negligent medical care, including a failure to respond adequately to the COVID-19 pandemic. In July 2020, <u>over 93% of people detained at Farmville tested positive for COVID-19</u>, and one person died. As a result of <u>litigation</u> brought by people detained at Farmville during the pandemic, ICE is operating the facility at a fraction of its capacity, with <u>only 17 people detained there as of January 23, 2023</u>. The contract is set to expire on September 15, 2023.

These are only a few examples of the abuses and harms of ICE detention across the United States. Empowered by the current and previous administrations to ignore and cover up these deadly conditions, ICE and the local entities and private prison corporations it contracts with continue to operate without repercussions, guaranteeing the facilities remain plagued by

systemic abuse. It has long been clear that immigration detention is a fundamentally flawed, inhumane, and unnecessary system that needs to end.

As the Biden administration is now halfway through its term, communities are looking to President Biden to deliver on his promises to bring fairness to the immigration system and reduce reliance on detention. The upcoming contract expirations provide another opportunity to do so. We urge you to decline to renew all detention contracts set to expire this year as a step towards fulfilling these promises. We also ask that you end the contracts for Alamance County Jail in North Carolina and Webb County Detention Center in Texas, both of which were set to expire earlier this year but were renewed.

We appreciate your attention to this urgent matter. As organizations representing and supporting people in ICE detention, including in the facilities listed above, we also request a meeting to further discuss the importance of ending these contracts.
