

## Summary of Changes in Access to Health Insurance and Public Benefits for T Visa Applicants

June 2024

In April 2024, two new final rules were published that guide the implementation of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) for qualified noncitizens and the T visa program.

- The <u>ACA rule</u> clarified that T visa applicants with bona fide determinations, T visa recipients, and family members with derivative T nonimmigrant status are considered qualified noncitizens who are eligible for health insurance under the ACA.
- The <u>T visa rule</u> established a process for US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) to issue bona fide determinations<sup>1</sup> (BFDs) for T visa applicants. This determination allows applicants with complete applications to receive a stay of removal, work authorization, and access to public benefits, including the ACA Health Insurance <u>Marketplace</u>, while they await their T visa decision.

While T visa recipients and derivatives were previously eligible to enroll in health insurance under the existing ACA rule, T visa *applicants* have been largely ineligible because USCIS has rarely issued BFDs since FY2010. When the new T visa final rule goes into effect, USCIS will begin to issue BFDs for existing and new T visa applications<sup>2</sup>, which will grant survivors access to public benefits many months earlier.

## How it will work:

After the T visa final rule goes into effect on August 28, 2024, USCIS will begin regularly issuing BFDs for applicants. After a BFD is issued, USCIS will notify the Office on Trafficking in Persons (OTIP) at the Department of Health and Human Services. OTIP will then notify the T visa applicant that they are eligible to request a <u>Certification Letter</u>.<sup>3</sup> After an applicant receives their Certification Letter, they will submit the letter to prove eligibility when they apply for health insurance through the Marketplace.

The same process is followed for T visa recipients and family members who receive T nonimmigrant derivative status. After a T visa or derivative visa is granted, USCIS will notify OTIP, which will begin the Certification Letter process.
